

Turning to the topic of sailing, since the last writing we had some great sailing adventures and get-togethers.

On June 1-2, 2013, I was able to attend our Woodward Reservoir sail and overnight get together. Before that weekend, we heard on the News that the Saturday temperatures at Woodward in the foothills would be pushing 100 degrees. I decided it would be best to go up Friday afternoon.

After burning the proverbial midnight oil to get my office work done to free the time on Friday afternoon, albeit a bit bleary-eyed, I



picked up my son Sam with my boat Dagmar in tow, and we were headed for Woodward Reservoir.

We made it up there by 3 pm Friday afternoon. It was good to see that a campsite had already been established at Area T. The Google earth photo that Rich McDevitt posted was extremely helpful in re-locating the campsite. As we drove into the campsite, it was good to see that the best campsites had been secured for us by Jerry Kergan, and to have our new home base enhanced by Bud and Linda's and Phil's RVs. I found our group engaged in lively conversation while sitting in chairs set up in the valuable shade created by the Newhall's camper canopy. Some had come early on Thursday and had done some sailing, while others arrived on Friday.

Sam and I proceeded to select a site to set up our "Taj Mahal" sized tent. At first we toyed with the idea of setting up part of the tent closer to the shade of the trees and the beach, but unfortunately the best areas to set up are marked with signs that say no tents past this point. So, to avoid the prospect of having a ranger tell us to move the tent after it was set up, we complied with the local ordinance and made sure no part of our tent transgressed the invisible line between the sign posts.

Conditions were pretty calm Friday afternoon, so the boats pretty much stayed on the beach. Others joined the group arriving later that afternoon, and we all had a great dinner and campfire that night.

The next morning a breeze picked up. Sam and I took Dagmar to the boat ramp, slid her off her trailer, and readied to take advantage of the sailing opportunities before the thermometer started climbing into the 90s. Rich and Mary McDevitt had just pulled in and we saw them setting up at the ramp. We enjoyed some sailing in light winds that morning, ranging from 0-5mph.

After a siesta in the shade for most of mid-day, most of the group set out for an afternoon sail which turned out to be really fun. After that, a beautiful sunset, a sumptuous pot luck dinner, great fun, music, and conversation into the wee hours made this was one of my most memorable and enjoyable Woodward Overnights ever.

Then there was our Wine Country Lake Hennessey sail on June 15, 2013.

When we started this fantastic day sail last year, it was 102 degrees and although Rich McDevitt wrote it up as the "Wake and Bake," we really had a lot of fun. When this year's temperatures for the event were predicted to be much more pleasant in the mid to low 80 degree range, I felt it would be even

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better than last year.

Let it be said that I feel a guilty pleasure in the Lake Hennessey sail because it seems to be such a well-kept secret that this is one of the best Potter Yachter sails there is from the standpoint of a beautiful environment to sail in, with absolutely no wakes from motor boats; in fact we virtually have this entire lake to ourselves. As you probably know, Lake Hennessey rules only permit boats 16' and under and motors 10 hp and under. That is great for keeping out the riff raff, but it meant that I could not bring my 18-19 foot P-19 Dagmar . Thankfully, Rich McDevitt allowed me to sail Minnow, while he sailed in Rick Keith's Potter 15. With Rich's P15 I got the same feeling I got when sailing with Jerry Barrilleaux on his P19 Sunshine: a very balanced, straightforward, and well thought out boat.

Also in attendance were Don Person, Jim Smith, and Steve Potter in his converted kayak sailboat, as well as newcomers Dana Suverkrop in his P15 and George Corrigan and wife in their Montgomery 15.

Motors were neither necessary nor attached (or at least not used) by the majority of the boats because these were superb conditions. We started at 65 degrees and got up to the low 80 degrees, with winds mostly between 5-10 mph. It was a beautiful sunny day for Pottering about the reeds and shoreline and finding the windy spots behind the dams.

We all went down to the far end of the lake and then enjoyed a long group run together with our boats within feet of one another all the way back to the dock. We saw the fishermen going in around noon and figured we would do the same as the day became hotter. Then we spent some time in the shade together, conversing and relishing the beauty of the lake and its surroundings, and a few others ventured out for a little more sailing before calling it a day.

All in all, thus far we have had some really great sails and overnights, and look forward to more. As of this writing, we are looking forward to a brand new sail and overnight brought to us by Kevin Crowder at New Spicer Meadows.




