
By Car:

Driving from Oakland, follow the "to Alameda" signs on Hwy 880 North or South. This will take you through the Webster Street Tube from Oakland into Alameda. You will be on Webster St in Alameda at this point. Go to the second stop light, turn left. You will be on Santa Clara. Turn left on Grand, a stop light, go on Grand to Clement, turn right on Clement. (If you go straight, you will end up in the Oakland Estuary. Don't do that.) In about a block, you will see gate 7 of the Marina complex on your left. Turn into that gate. Follow the "Island Yacht Club" signs, and you are there! **Things to bring** for the Potter Class: 1. Some **lunch** (break will be short). 2. Bring **Pencils, erasers, paper**, and any navigation tools you already have, SF Bay charts, GPS etc. (GPS is optional).

Some that are planned include, Navigating Shipping Channels safely, Using the VHF Radio Properly, Reading Tide and Current Tables, Calculating a course, using Line of Sight Navigation and ranges, Navigating Fog with and without GPS, and so on. This won't be a complete course of Navigation by any means, but will be a good 'brush up' for the experienced skippers, and a good introduction to new members as to some of the knowledge they may wish to develop further in future. Going up-wind, the telltales are streaming nicely, on the leeward side...

Sailing in High Winds and Choppy Waters on the South Bay!

Oyster Point is about twelve miles south of San Francisco on the west side of the bay. Ballena Bay is a little northeast, eight miles away, on the east side of the bay and on the northwest part of Alameda Island. This sail can be expected to produce calm, light wind, gentle wind, moderate wind, and sometimes, *almost gale force wind* as the day progresses. The sea state goes from flat to pretty aggressively confused chop. Fairly strong current is the rule so it is prudent to know its times and direction as the route crosses it. Typically the morning launch at Oyster Point is very relaxed. Oyster is a well maintained facility and has a well protected launch ramp, with a very good small store and deli. The wind in the morning is light at the start but sailing is usually possible for an hour or so. At about the midpoint of the trip we motor up, toward Ballena, as what little wind there was, is behind us. The water is flat, so there is a peaceful hour or so to relax, to listen to the sound of the motor and contemplate just how pleasant sailing day it is. The Ballena Bay Harbor entrance is a little tricky to find but is about a mile south of the aircraft carrier Hornet which is easy to spot. The Harbor Master is helpful about letting us tie up at the dinghy dock and not charging for our stay while we have lunch at the small cafe. The marina is very clean and pleasant and a good destination for a day sail. After drinks and sandwiches we head out. Rounding the point into the bay we find about five knots of wind and sail away. The wind begins to rise, shifting



sharply to the west, directly on our nose. The next hour, as we tack, the wind gradually increases until, again about midway, it is really blowing pretty good and the chop is one to two feet. It isn't long until heeling is getting excessive, the chop is bouncing us around, and it is time to reef. This settles things down quite a bit. The wind is up to 20 knots plus, the chop now is about three feet, very confused, and there is a fair amount of pounding. Also a lot of spray comes over the bow. P 15's sail quite dry, but on this trip, boats and skippers ended up wet. Even with sails reefed, all of us were good and wet! With forceful wind dead ahead and the mean chop, we are not making much headway and as the sun is setting the motor is again called upon for the last half mile. We all made the Oyster Point ramp at dusk and by the time the boats were ready for the road it was dark. All in all a grand sail with a chance to use all the virtues of a P15 from quiet noodling to spirited action. They are really fine little vessels. *(Story and photos by Don Person)*

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
