NEXT SAIL SAT. MARCH 7

Join us as we explore upstream on the winding Petaluma River. This will be a different type of sail, in a rather narrow water way. Depending on wind direction, it could become mostly an interesting motorboat ride. Meet at 10:00 a.m. and launch at the Petaluma River Public Fishing Access, plus, it's free. This is directly under the Petaluma River overpass bridge of Highway 37, about 3 miles Northeast of U.S. 101. From 37, going Northeast, use the Atherton Ave./Black Point Rd. exit and follow the Black Point signs on Harbor Dr. for 1 mile. The launch ramp is on the right. If you are traveling Southwest, use the first frontage road exit after crossing the bridge.

LAST MONTHS BENICIA SAIL
