The Soules were joined by friends and Jon also had family along, so although there were only three boats, there were quite a few sailors. We headed out toward Angel Island on a strong ebb, accomplishing the crossing in less than an hour. Jon and family headed for the docks at the Island, while *Nighthawk* and *Riptide* decided to go for the circumnavigation of the island, proceeding through Raccoon Straits with some difficulty due to a lack of wind. As most of you are probably aware, the Potter Yachters have become the newest members of the Pacific Inter Club Yachting Association (PICYA). We joined the association at the end of 2023, and I have attended two association meetings this year, one at the Marin Yacht Club in February, and a second at the Ballena Bay yacht club in March. These meeting consist of dinner or lunch and a relatively short business meeting. We have three official delegates to the association: Jon Barber, Phil Marcelis, and me. The next meeting will be at the Benicia Yacht club on April 6. Delegates are allowed to bring guests, so if you are interested in coming along to one of these let one of us know.

The club has both power boat and sailing clubs as members. One of the benefits of membership is the custom of allowing members to stay overnight at the facilities of other members. We have been well received and I have been personally greeted by the representatives of many of our favorite venues including the Elkhorn Yacht Club, Oakland Yacht Club, Benicia Yacht Club, Napa Valley Yacht Club, and the Loch Lomond Club. If you wish to stay at a member club, you should contact them in advance about logistics and permission to tie up. All were very enthusiastic about our paying them a visit. We also got an invitation from the Encinal Yacht Club.


The association has several activities it supports. This includes a scholarship fund, a sponsored sail for injured veterans (the Wheelchair Regatta, September 28-29, Encinal Yacht Club), and a 3-day series of sailing races known as the Lipton Cup Regatta (June 14-16, San Francisco Yacht Club). The association is also a big supporter of the Recreational Boaters of California (RBOC) an organization which lobbies for recreational boaters. This organization has been instrumental in keeping registration fees for trailerable boats low. They are currently fighting a proposal to charge boaters for the property underneath their boats while renting a slip in a marina.

The biggest upcoming event is <u>Opening Day on the Bay</u>, April 28. The PICYA will be participating in the boat parade and hopes to have at least one boat from each club in the parade. The theme this year is "Rock the Bay". The idea is that boats will be decorated with some kind of rock and roll motif. It would be great if we were able to field several boats for this event.

He was maybe 200 feet short when the wind was completely blocked. Cynthia and I towed him rest of way and he readily fixed the hose. Then Tyler dropped his CPYC access card into the water! It sank. I jumped in, almost naked, and retrieved it. Oh, YES! All good!



That night the St. Pat's Dinner was great—Irish Dancers; Zydeco Band for live music, and about 15 Zydeco Groupie Dancers (who follow the band around). Cynthia and I and many others danced a bunch. 

Do you have your California Boater Card yet?



- If you operate a vessel and are 60 years old or under, you are required to have a Cal Boater Card in all California waters as of January 1st, 2024.
- If you are over 60, all persons regardless of age will be required to have a Cal Boater Card as of January 1st, 2025.
- <u>Click Here to get your Cal Boating Card</u>
- Vessel operators who are required to have the California Boater Card must carry the card on board the vessel and have it available for inspection by an enforcement officer. Not carrying your California Boater Card when it is required can result in a fine.
- If you have BoatUS, you can get it through them. Look for more information in next month's newsletter.
