### LAST MONTH'S CAMANCHE LAKE SAIL - Reported by Harry Gordon

The nine Potters at Camanche Lake on the weekend of Oct. 6-7 sailed uncrowded waters in good weather. Saturday: steady winds, smooth waters, spectacular skyscapes, and a memorable sunset; Sunday: clear skies but skimpy, unreliable winds. Attending were Frank Winans, 182; the Gordons, 234; the Simpsons, 266; the Marshes, 512; the Adairs, 567; the Nelsons, 584; the Johes, 773; Don Bergst, 797; and the Butlers, 850. Some arrived Friday night and the rest on Saturday. All stayed over Saturday night.

A startling sight was to see the Marsh boys apparently standing on the water out in the

lake, but it wasn't a miracle--they were standing on surfboards.

The camping area was ideally situated on a large cove. Specific campsites were not designated so the Potter Yachters formed a gypsy camp on the grassy beach. There were only a few other campers. Showers, restrooms, a playground, and drinking water were only about a hundred yards away. There was a launch ramp down the road a couple of miles, but everyone chose to launch and recover on thebeach by the campsites.

Several boats made excursions to a small Indian cave on the shore of China Gulch several miles away. A large rock in the cave had numerous holes the Indians had hollowed out for grinding acorns, and the 'ceiling' of the cave was blackened by the smoke of past campfires.

Saturday night's campfire activities included an introduction to Bob Adair's "b'ar hunting" game. (How many fell for that besides me?) Those who could stay awake longer watche "Saturday Night Live" on the Adair's TV. (That's my idea of roughing it -- watching TV outdoors


## THE BARRILLEAUX FAMILY HAS A NEW BABY! (14's a girl!!)

CENTERBOARD TIE-DOWN DEVICE - by Walt Nobs


"We noted in 'Rat Tales' in the Sept.

"Potter to Potter" that some of us are
looking for a good tie-down for the
centerboard. Maybe some would be interested
in the tie-down we use on 351.

All that's required is a \text{\chi}" bolt (long enough to go through the centerboard trunk), a small turnbuckle (the type with a hook on one end), and a short link of stout wire (we used a hunk of heavy coat hanger wire).

It's simple to make and is a pretty solid tie-down. When not in use, slack off the turnbuckle, unhook it, and the thing swings down out of the way.

The sketch is pretty much self-explanatory. One note, the ½" bolt must be positioned high enough in the trunk to allow the centerboard to be fully retracted. So far haven't flipped over but am sure this rig will keep the board from falling out or jumping off the pin."



## XEROXING IS NO PROBLEM

Just another 'friendly reminder' that I need some volunteers for Newsletter Editor, especially for the month of Dec.
