
West Wight Potter For Sale CLASSIFIED

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Q Why do so many boaters choose the Type III PFD (Personal Flotation Device)?

A Many boaters find the Type III PFD's to be a good compromise between comfort and safety, and will voluntarily wear them in their boating activities. Type III PFD's are lifesavers because people wear them. Again, the Type III PFD is designed so that the wearer can place himself or herself in a vertical or slightly backward position and the device will maintain the wearer in that position and have <u>no tendency</u> to turn the wearer face down.

Q Are there really four types of fog?

A Yes there are. We can distinguish four types of fog: RADIATION FOG, formed in near-calm conditions by the cooling of the ground on a clear night as a result of radiation of heat from the ground to the clear sky; ADVECTION FOG, formed by the flow of warm air over cold sea or lake; STEAM FOG, or SEA SMOKE, formed when cold air blows over much warmer water; and PRECIPITATION FOG, formed when rain coming out of warm air aloft falls through a shallow layer of cold air at the earth's steady winds blow landward and carry warm oceanic air across cold coastal water, the resulting fog may blanket a great length of coastline and especially at night, may extend many miles inland up bays and rivers. It can be seen on land as it blows past street lights.

Knots


Perhaps the most common failing among cruising sailors is in the appreciation of the proper and safe way to belay and coil a long line such as a halyard. Variations are infinite; most are clumsy, even dangerous. The essence of good seamanship is that things on a boat be tidy and efficient. When coiling and stowing a halyard, therefore, you want it to lie neatly and be free to run quickly when you have to drop sail in a hurry as when a squall rolls in.


Belay your halyards to their cleats (Fig. 5). Then coil the line starting about six inches from the cleat, making large coils (not around your elbow). Give three-strand line a half-twist; let braided line fall naturally in figure eights. Then, reach through the coil, make a bight in the six-inch line, pull it through and loop it over the cleat.


Simple and neat. That's the way


all knots should be on a boat. Use the right ones for basic stuff, then the fancy ones will come more easily as you gain confidence and manual dexterity.
