Optional Sail: Sunday, October 19, Lake Elizabeth, Fremont





Last Sail: October 11, Coyote Point Marina

It was the beginning of "Fleet Week." The US Navy battle group fleet sailed under the Golden Gate Bridge and into the Bay.
